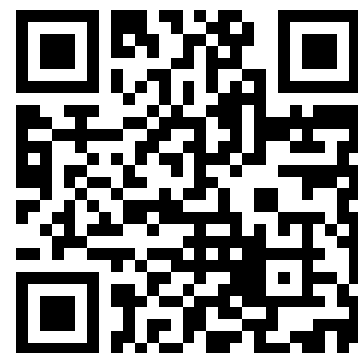

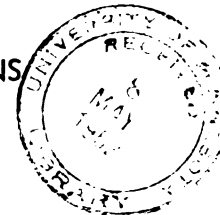

STATISTICS OF PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEMS SERVING POPULATIONS
OF 50,000 to 99,999: FISCAL YEAR 1960

Since 1870 the Office of Education has conducted statistical surveys of libraries. These appeared originally as "Statistics of Public, Society and School Libraries." As the number of libraries grew and their functions and activities became more specialized, separate studies of the various types of libraries were released. During the 1930's a new pattern of library statistics was established which resulted in separate publications on public, college and university, and public school libraries.

Comprehensive nationwide public library surveys were made for the years 1938-39, 1944-45, 1950, and 1955-56. The next comprehensive (5-year) study is planned to include 1961-1962 statistics. Since comprehensive surveys cannot be completed rapidly, it was decided that a limited amount of basic data should be collected annually and released speedily to provide information on significant developments. These basic public library surveys were inaugurated in 1945.

Originally this series covered two groups of cities, those with populations of 50,000 to 99,999 and those with 100,000 or more. Since then, three other publications for county and regional libraries and those serving smaller population groups were added. In 1960, the Library Services Branch issued five separate publications of 1959 data, one for public libraries in cities with populations of 100,000 or more (OE-15014A Rev.), one for those in cities of 50,000 to 99,999 (OE-15015), one for those in cities of 35,000 to 49,999 (OE-15016), one for county and regional public library systems serving populations of 50,000 or more (OE-15017), and one for county and regional public library systems serving 35,000 to 49,999 (OE-15018). For 1960 the data for these five population groups are being merged in three publications which cover public libraries whether municipal, county, or regional serving populations of

- (1) 100,000 or more (OE-15033)
- (2) 50,000 to 99,999 (OE-15034)
- (3) 35,000 to 49,999 (OE-15035)

With the adoption of a common masthead, public libraries now share with public school and college and university libraries a statistical series of basic data supplementing the comprehensive surveys.

The Nation's Public Library Pattern

According to information from heads of State library extension agencies, there are 8,190 public library systems in the aggregate United States.^{1/} (See table 1.) Ranked by States, New York leads with 624, followed by Illinois with 468 and Iowa with 432. Three other States (Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and Michigan) each have more than 300; 13 States have more than 200; 9 States more than 100; and 23 States fewer than 100 public library systems. The District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Canal Zone, Virgin Islands, and Guam account for 13 public library systems.

The Great Lakes and Plains and the North Atlantic regions (see table 1A) have the highest percentage of all public library systems in the United States (38.0 percent and 31.8 percent, respectively). Only in these two regions does the library percentage exceed the population percentage. In the Great Lakes and Plains region, the proportion is one public library system to serve 16,582, but in the Southeast, one system serves an average of 34,326 people. The distribution of public library systems by size of population served (see table 2) is more revealing since it pinpoints the major problem: There are too many libraries which are too small to render adequate service as described by the standards in "Public Library Service."^{2/}

Projections of the Census Bureau indicate that public libraries will have to serve a rapidly growing number of readers particularly among our junior (5 to 19 years) and senior (65 years and over) citizens. (See chart 1 and table 3.) This basic problem of providing adequate library service to a rapidly growing population, whose educational level may depend upon its access to an expanding body of knowledge, is accentuated by increased library costs and a shortage of trained staff.

Nearly 85 percent of expenditures of public library systems serving populations of 50,000 to 99,999 are utilized for salaries and library materials. The cost of library materials such as books, periodicals, and serial publications between 1947-1949 and 1960 indicates a price rise far in excess of that reported for commodities in the same period by the wholesale and consumer price indexes.^{3/}

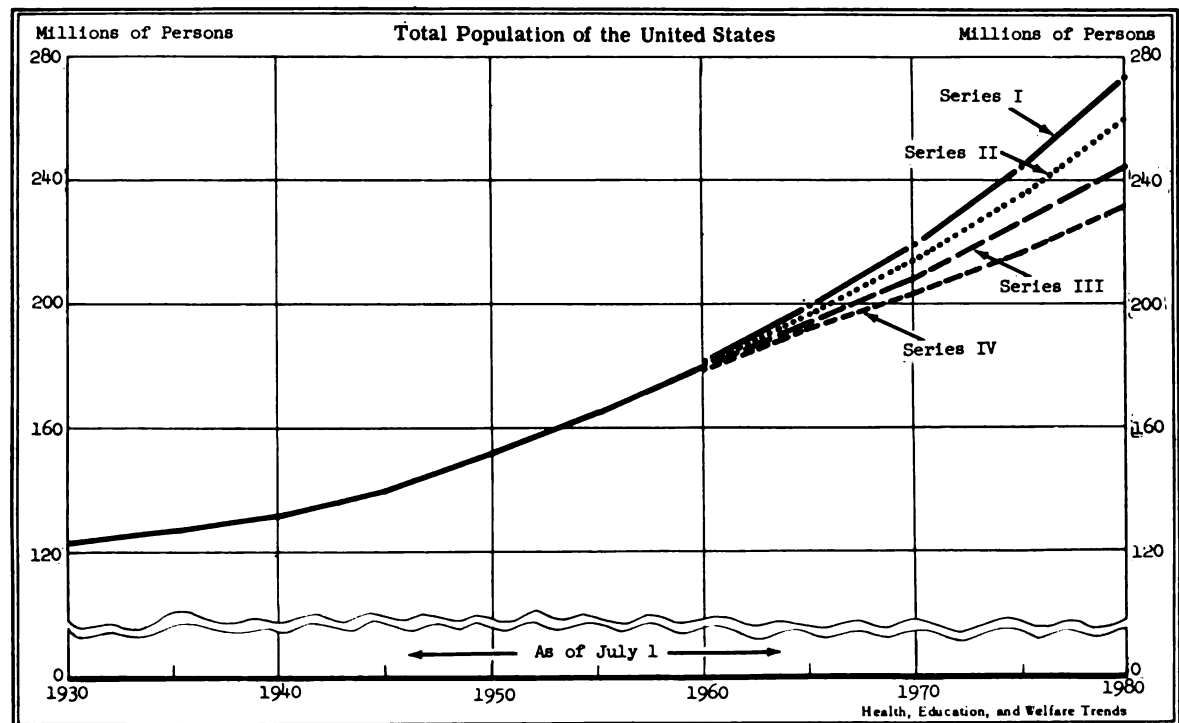

POPULATION BY AGE GROUPS: 1900-1980

The population of the United States, including the armed forces overseas, was 100.0 million according to the census of April 1, 1960. About 52 percent of the population are in the main productive age groups 20-64; 38 percent are 19 and under; and 9 percent are 65 or over. Census Bureau projections indicate a total population of over 200 million in 1970 and between 232 and 274 million by 1980.

Scope of Survey and Presentation of Data

There are 318 public library systems reported serving population areas from 50,000 to 99,999 persons. (See table 4.) This is 3.97 percent of all public library systems. The 318 libraries of this category make service available to 12 percent of the population. With the addition of the next larger category (100,000 and above), 7 percent of the present public library systems serve nearly 58 percent of the total population.

Until 1959 the annual public library statistical publications presented institutional statistics; gave some summary data, percentage breakdowns, and per capita figures; and indicated through historical tables, significant changes over the years. They answered the basic questions of "how much" was the

financial support, "how many" librarians were employed, and "how many" books and other library materials were purchased and circulated by an individual system. This descriptive information is again made available in tables 4 and 5, but it is now supplemented by analytic data in tables 6 and 7 which permit some answers to the question of "how well" a library compares with all others in a given group.

Now, values are given for the minimum and maximum, the median, and the first and third quartile points. The first quartile point (or the 25th percentile) is the point above which 75 percent of all libraries fall and below which 25 percent fall; the median is the point above and below which

half of the libraries fall; the third quartile point (or 75th percentile) is the point above which 25 percent fall. Previously comparisons could be made only on an institution-by-institution basis; they can now be made for the 318 libraries in two groups--those with total annual expenditures of above \$100,000 and those with expenditures below. When using tables 6 and 7, it should be noted that the values in each category were arrived at independently. For example, the maximum for adult circulation in table 7 was reported by the Santa Monica Public Library and the maximum for juvenile circulation by the East Orange Free Library, N. J. This can be verified by checking columns 10 and 11 in table 4.

As in surveys of previous years, information is provided on the following:

I. EXPENDITURES:--(1) Total operating expenditures, (2) salary expenditures, (3) expenditures for library materials, (4) binding and rebinding expenditures, (5) other operating expenditures, and (6) capital outlay.

II. LIBRARY RESOURCES:--(1) Bookstock, (2) annual additions, and (3) circulation.

III. PERSONNEL:--(1) Number of staff in full-time equivalent positions, (2) professional staff in full-time equivalent positions, (3) number of vacant budgeted position and (4) initial salaries for library school graduates.

The data on the beginning annual salary offered to library school graduates have been added to this survey for the first time.

In the 318 public library systems in the 50,000-99,999 group, representing 4 percent of all the public library units in the United States, library services are made available to a population of 21 million persons. These libraries share and will continue to share with the class above them (libraries serving populations of 100,000 and more) the necessity of serving an increasingly larger metropolitan population. There was an increase of 39 percent in potential users in the last decade. This increase outranked the general growth of population by 19 percent, indicating the magnitude and tempo of change required.

Membership in this group of libraries has changed markedly. In 1959, there were 118 libraries included in the 50,000-99,999 circular. Population changes and the inclusion of county and regional libraries make a total of 318 libraries in this circular.

The State of California now contains the largest number of libraries in this class, 26; followed by North Carolina, 24; Pennsylvania, 21; Michigan, 18; Texas, 16; Ohio, 13; and New Jersey; 12. Population losses account for the omission of reports in the size-category from three libraries in Georgia, two each in Arkansas and Mississippi, and one each in Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Texas.

Comparisons between the 1959 survey (systems of 50,000 to 99,999) and 1960 survey should be approached with caution. The 1960 survey is neither the same in size nor in composition, nor are the base data at all comparable. Per capita averages for 1959 were derived from 1950 census figures and included a cumulative error of 9 years of unrecorded population change. The 1960 averages have been obtained by employing 1960 population figures from the most recent decennial census. Furthermore, the 1960 figures differ in composition from the 1959 survey in that they now incorporate

statistics from both county and regional library systems and municipal libraries in this single report. The 1959 data presented here in table 5 are adjusted to make them comparable with their accompanying 1960 data.

Analysis of Library Services

An evaluation of public library systems on the basis of key items is given in tables 5, 6, and 7. The 318 public library systems of this class were divided into two groups: those with annual operating expenditures below \$100,000 (referred to as Group A), and those in excess of \$100,000 (referred to as Group B). The total number of libraries in Group A (table 6) is 212 and in Group B (table 7) is 106. The division, although made on fiscal data, significantly relates such indexes as bookstock, personnel, and circulation within each division. The median operating expenditure for libraries in Group A is \$49,700; that of Group B is \$163,600.

One can assume an increase in operating expenditures with a corresponding increase in that portion allocated to personal services. Although the per capita average for operating expenditure seems to be lower in 1960 than in the preceding year, this is only an apparent decline. General circulation figures have risen markedly in the 318 public libraries, with the amount of materials loaned for children greater than that loaned for adult reading. Bookstock has increased 20 percent during the year.

Total Operating Expenditures

Total operating expenditures for 318 public library systems reached \$30,979,000 in 1960. This is 20 percent higher than the corresponding expenditure in 1959 and averages \$1.43 per capita. This per capita is but 71 percent of the \$1.85 per capita expended by libraries in the population class 100,000 and over. The minimum expenditure for Group A libraries was \$3,400 and the maximum expenditure \$99,200 (table 6, columns 7 and 3); for Group B, the minimum expenditure was \$100,300 and the maximum expenditure was \$484,200 (table 7, columns 7 and 3).

Salary Expenditures and Personnel

The libraries included in this category expended a total of \$20,345,000 for personal services in 1960, 66 percent of the operating expenditure (table 5). The median outlay for salaries in Group A library systems was \$29,900 (table 6, column 5) and in Group B library systems \$109,300. (See table 7, column 5.) The 318 library systems employed 5,653 persons. Of these 1,622 (29 percent) were in professional positions (table 5). The ratio of staff to population in the service area is one staff member to 3,800 persons. For the class 100,000 and above, the ratio is one employee to 3,600 persons. The standards of the American Library Association for public library service call for a minimum provision of one staff member for each 2,500 people in the

service area ^{4/}: To meet this ratio the present number of staff members (5,653) would have to be increased to 8,600, an increase of 52 percent in personnel.

Again information was requested on vacant budgeted professional positions. There were 153 such vacancies reported this year. No single library had a high number of vacancies. Of the 318 public library systems reporting, 111 had staff vacancies of one or more professional positions. The largest number of vacancies was three in Group A (table 6, column 3), and five in Group B (table 7, column 3). There is a vacancy rate of 2.7 percent in budgeted professional positions for the 318 libraries. While the 111 vacancies reported indicate actual budgeted positions requiring professional qualifications, they do not include positions filled temporarily by staff not meeting the requirements.

Library schools accredited by the American Library Association in 1960 graduated 1,506 students qualified to fill these vacancies. Public library positions were accepted by 520 of these students. A salary survey of beginning salaries for the year for professional graduates established \$5,083 as the initial average salary.^{5/} This figure (\$5,083) may be compared with the median beginning professional salary of \$4,200 for librarians (with the 5th-year degree) reported in these libraries with expenditures below \$100,000.

Expenditures for Library Materials and Binding Services

Public libraries in the group 50,000-99,999 spent an average of 17.6 percent of their operating funds on library materials. Purchases of books, periodicals, and audiovisual materials amounted to a total of \$5,471,000.

The largest share of funds spent for materials, \$4,974,000, purchased books. This amount was 31 percent higher than the 1959 expenditure of \$3,785,000. Periodical purchases represent \$301,000 of the materials expenditure or 1 percent of all operating funds. Although this represents an increase of 17 percent over the same expenditure for 1959, it is a decline from 1.1 percent of all operating expenditures in 1959.

Expenditures for audiovisual materials have risen 7.7 percent in the year. The increase from \$182,000 to \$196,000 has, nevertheless, been insufficient to maintain this item's share of total operating expenditures in 1960. The percentage of total operating expenditures spent for audiovisual materials has declined slightly from 0.7 percent (1959) to 0.6 percent (1960).

Outlays for binding and rebinding services retain their share of the total operating expenditures. They remain at 1.3 percent in 1960. The sum of \$309,000 spent for such services in 1959 has increased 27 percent to \$390,000 in 1960.

Other Operating Expenditures and Capital Outlay

Other operating expenditures accounted for 15.4 percent of the total amount expended on operations. This item has moved upward in its share of all operating expenditures from 15.1 percent in 1959. In actual dollars expenditures there has been a 27 percent gain from \$3,713,000 in 1959 to \$4,773,000 in 1960.

The \$7,252,000 expended for capital outlay in 1960 represents funds spent for buildings, sites, additions, and improvements. Capital outlay remains in 1960 a relatively high percentage of the total financial commitment for the 318 public library systems--24 percent. The total is above that for 1959 (\$6,281,000) and well above the percentage share (21 percent) of capital outlay for that year.

Bookstock and Circulation

Library holdings showed a marked increase for the group, rising from 20,033,000 volumes in 1959 to 24,586,000 volumes in 1960. Although the 1960 total seemed to represent a decline per capita from 1.32 in 1959 to 1.13 in 1960 we must recall that the 1959 per capita figure was based on the 1950 census. An adjusted estimate would indicate that there has been a modest gain, probably from 1 volume per capita in 1959 to 1.3 volumes per capita for the 318 library systems in 1960.

Median holding of Group A libraries is 45,500 volumes. The median collection for Group B libraries is 126,900 volumes. For Group A libraries the median number of volumes added was 3,700; for group B libraries, 8,500. (See tables 6 and 7, column 5.)

Circulation of all materials from the 318 public library systems increased substantially in the year 1960. In 1959, 78,645,000 volumes were loaned for home use and in the following year 93,178,000 volumes were circulated. (See table 5.) The recorded circulation of adult materials increased 23 percent from 31,216,000 in 1959 to 38,027,000 in 1960. Meanwhile circulation of children's materials increased 11 percent in the year from 42,240,000 volumes in 1959 to 47,510,000 volumes in 1960.

Per capita figures for circulation on table 5 indicate a drop from 5.1 to 4.2 for 1960. The median circulation of materials for Group A libraries in 1960 was 191,200 volumes and in Group B libraries the median was 429,400 volumes. With 198 libraries out of 212 reporting in Group A, the median circulation for juvenile material of 99,300 volumes exceeded that for median adult circulation of 81,400 volumes. But for Group B libraries (with 96 out of 106 libraries reporting), the median figure for adult circulation, 212,700 volumes, exceeded the median figure, 197,000 volumes, for juvenile materials.

Group A and Group B Libraries Compared

The median expenditures, \$49,700 for Group A (table 6) and \$163,600 for Group B (table 7) can be expressed as a ratio: 1: 3.4. Marked deviations from this ratio of the medians should call attention to the deviant items.

One such divergence is in funds spent for binding and rebinding. The median number for Group A libraries is \$400; that for Group B libraries is \$2,300--a ratio of 1:5.8.

Although one could not expect the ratio of 1:3.4 of total expenditures between Group A and Group B public libraries to apply to a comparison of the medians of Group A and Group B libraries for initial professional salaries, there is a differential: Group A public libraries offer a median of \$4,200 as compared with \$4,620 in the Group B public libraries.

But median initial salaries do not necessarily progress with the increase in total expenditure. For example, public libraries in the category of populations of 100,000 and over (OE-15033) offer median beginning professional salaries of \$4,500 for those libraries with expenditures below \$500,000, and \$4,675 for those libraries with expenditures above \$500,000. These are not too much larger than those noted above for libraries in the 50,000 to 99,999 category. This similarity in the median initial salaries for professional librarians ranging through institutions serving populations of 50,000 to the largest in the nation may indicate the wide demand for professional librarians.

The libraries reported upon in this circular, along with the libraries in the group above (100,000 and over), will be the major group concerned with the rapid population changes occurring in our Nation. There is reported here a positive correlation, in most cases, between growing responsibilities and increasing materials, personnel, and functions.
